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Restore Illinois

Governor J.B. Pritzker announced his <u>Restore Illinois</u> plan to reopen the state. The plan outlines four regions in Illinois with five different phases that the different regions can move through based on specific criteria. For reference: Phase One is a strict stay-at-home order as we experienced throughout April, while Phase Five will be attained when a vaccine or treatment is available. Currently, all of Illinois is in Phase Two. Different guidelines are present at each phase.

The plan outlines a series of metrics for a region to advance to the next or return to the previous phase. The state's four regions are based on already existing Emergency Management System regions. A region's status on each of the metrics can be seen on the Illinois Department of Public Health's website.

In the days since the plan was released, some have praised the plan while other have criticized. However, Gov. Pritzker has stated that getting an effective treatment can change everything.
