Stalemate in Washington, D.C.

Senate Republicans did <u>not advance</u> their proposed COVID-19 stimulus bill last week. Sixty votes would have been required to move the bill toward passage; however, only 52 were acquired.

With the bill's halt, stimulus bill negotiations stand at a stalemate. Some <u>experts</u> explore whether additional stimulus checks or PPP expansions are possible and potential timelines for any additional relief packages.
