

Identity Theft Information for Businesses

2017 Filing Season

- Processed 135.6 million tax returns
- Issued 97 million refunds
- Dispersed \$270 billion in refunds
 - Average refund: \$2,700
- 69 percent of IRS collections from payroll managers



PATH Act Requirements

- Objective: Fight fraud and identity theft
- Accelerated W-2 Filings to January 31
- Required a hold on certain refunds until February 15
 - —Earned Income Tax Credit
 - —Additional Child Tax Credit
- Voluntary W-2 acceleration program under review for 2018



Tax-Related Identity Theft Actions

- Improved IDT filters
- Limited direct deposits
- Locked deceased taxpayers accounts
- Partnered with banks to ID suspicious refunds
- Created Identity Protection PINs
- Convicted more than 2,000 identity thieves



Security Summit Initiatives

- Shared data elements from return
- Required stronger password protocols
- Agreed on ISAC
- Agreed on stronger cybersecurity framework
- Two-factor authentication protections for certain IRS.gov tools



Initiative Results for 2016

- More returns stopped before entering processing pipeline
- Confirmed identity theft returns dropped 30 percent
- Fraudulent refunds identified by banks fell 50 percent
- People identifying themselves as IDT victims fell 46 percent



Security Summit Initiatives - 2017

- Shared data elements expanded to business tax returns
- W-2 Verification Code test expanded to 50 million forms
- Additional data elements identified
- States partnering with banks
- Summit partners working to identify "ultimate bank accounts"



Look Ahead

- "Verification Code" box will appear on 2017
 Form W-2
- W-2 Verification Code test will continue into next year
- Contact IRS to discontinue EIN should business close
- Educate employees about security practices
 - —IRS Publication 4524, Security Awareness for Taxpayers



Beware W-2 Scam

- Dangerous phishing email targets employers and payroll employees
- Impersonates CEO and asks for list of all employees and their W-2
- 50 victims last year, 200 victims so far this year
- Report at dataloss@irs.gov
- Details at IRS.gov/identitytheft



Victim Assistance

- You tell us
 - —E-file return rejects; duplicate SSN
 - —File return by paper; attach Form 14039, Identity Theft Affidavit
 - Generates an Identity Protection PIN once case resolved



Victim Assistance

- We tell you
 - Suspicious return generates Letter 4883C or Letter 5747C to verify identity by phone or in person
 - If taxpayer did not file return, it is removed from account; IP PIN generated
 - —No need to file a Form 14039



Steps for Victims of Tax-Related Identity Theft

- Complete and file IRS Form 14039
- Respond to any IRS letters or notices
- Continue to pay taxes, even if by paper
- Place a "fraud alert" on credit accounts by contacting one of the three main credit bureaus
- Close any accounts opened by criminals
- File a complaint with the FTC



Centralizing Victim Assistance

- Most victim assistance work centralized under one director
- New Identity Theft Victim Assistance organization created
- Policy and operations under one leadership team
- More consistent treatment for taxpayers
- Reviewing IDTVA process for improvements



About the Identity Protection PIN (IP PIN)

- Six-digit number that adds an additional layer of protection along with the SSN or ITIN
- Victims notified once tax-related IDT case resolved
- Taxpayer will receive a CP01A notice containing a new IP PIN each year
- Some taxpayers have the option of getting an IP PIN from IRS.gov
- Enter numbers for all IP PIN holders



Victim Assistance - What's New

- Letter 5747C taxpayers do not need to verify in person if they call and say they did NOT file the return
- New CP-01E sent to taxpayers who may be victims of employment-related identity theft
- Only taxpayers may access transcripts for years with an IDT indicator,
- But tax pros may now access transcripts for those years without an indicator



How You Can Help

- Review Pub 4557, Safeguarding Taxpayer Data
- Use best security practices at all times
- Contact your IRS Stakeholder Liaison immediately in case of data loss
- Maintain, monitor and protect EFIN
- Help education clients about Security
- Warn employers of Form W-2 scam
