Lt. Col. Darling retired from the United States Marine Corps in 2007 with just over twenty years of active-duty service. After an impressive early career piloting attack helicopters in Desert Shield, Desert Storm, and as a presidential pilot with Marine Helicopter Squadron One, he was handpicked in October 2000 to work for the White House Military Office, Airlift Operations Department. It was in this position that, during the attack of September 11, 2001, he supported the President, Vice President, and National Security Advisor in the underground President's Emergency Operations Center (PEOC) and witnessed unprecedented leadership and decision making at the highest levels of our government. Lt. Col. Darling chronicles these developments in his book: 24 Hours Inside the President's Bunker, 9/11/01: The White House, and shares the principles of crisis leadership and decision making with his audiences with an "edge of your seat" presentation that'll take you from the moment the attack was realized, to the courageous decisions made to stop it, to the safeguards and policies our country now has in-place in an attempt to prevent it from ever happening again. 9:15 – 10:15 a.m. General Session - Closing the Loop: Using Counterfeit IDs to Improve Future Documents-Elaine Wooton, Forensic Document Examiner Department of Homeland Security, Homeland Security Investigations, Forensic Laboratory & Mark Baxter, Detective/Liquor Inspector Howard County Maryland Police Department

High quality counterfeit driver licenses for all fifty states are circulating everywhere in the United States. To improve the likelihood of determining the authenticity of these documents, there is an endless, repeating pattern of creating and releasing a new design, waiting for the counterfeits to appear, watching the counterfeits improve, and then creating another new design. This process is inevitable - but having more information about the capabilities of the counterfeiters can lengthen the time that the counterfeit versions can be easily detected. Learn how the DHS Forensic Lab obtains counterfeit documents and analyzes them - providing vital assessments and technical support for new document design to the licensing jurisdictions – through collaboration with nearby agencies. This allows quick analysis of seized documents and in return, agencies receive relevant updates on recent counterfeiting techniques, methods to identify suspect security features, and overall insight on national counterfeiting trends.

Workshop 1 - Illegal Practices of Mobile Bars, Jeff Rodean, Detective, Idaho State Police, Alcohol Beverage Control REGULATORY ONLY

Mobile bars have become a staple of communities for the last several years, as they have changed the landscape of alcohol service, especially since the COVID-19 pandemic. However, many are not conducting business legally on paper as required by state laws. Specifically in Idaho, there are no licenses available exclusively for a mobile bar to conduct catering events. Rather, they must be an extension of a brick-and-mortar location that possesses a retail alcohol license such as a restaurant or bar. However, this is not always the case, as many mobile bars uncovered through investigations have illegally sold liquor, beer, and wine while operating as a separate business without the proper licensing. This can lead to a myriad of issues including overservice, serving minors, and criminal charges by all parties involved. This presentation will include case studies of illegal mobile bars uncovered in Idaho and subsequent court proceedings, as well as the guidelines Alcohol Beverage Control has instilled in conjunction with state law to ensure compliance moving forward.

Workshop 2 - Corrective Licensing and Licensing Compliance Programs: Addressing Nuisance Bars, Todd Merlina, Division Chief, Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board (PPCB), Bureau of Licensing, Administrative and Divergent Licensee Affairs Division

This presentation will provide an understanding of the PLCBs program to approach problem licensed establishments. In 2023 the PLCB initiated the reinvention of authorities provided through legislation. This reinvention included presentations at monthly District Attorney and Chiefs of Police meetings throughout the



state. These presentations create relationships to help understand liquor laws, timelines to address problem establishments, an explanation of the conduct/activity in and around licensed establishments that subject them to inspections and review for non-renewal and the potential results of a license being renewed with a Conditional Licensing Agreement and/or an Offer in Compromise. Due to the Corrective Licensing program only giving the PLCB the opportunity to review licenses during the renewal period, as part of the program, Law Enforcement is offered the option of coordinating meetings with owners and managers of establishments that are or becoming a problem for the community. A representative of the Bureau of Licensing attends these meetings to explain the Corrective Licensing and Licensing Compliance Programs and the responsibilities of liquor licenses.

Workshop 3 –Beverage Girl Operations in Florida, Uncovering Human Trafficking, Major Claire Espada-Diaz and Captain Alex Morales, Florida Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco, Bureau of Law Enforcement

The investigation of several locations licensed to sell alcoholic beverages in south Florida revealed nearly 500 women working/trafficked as Beverage Girls to pay off their debt for being smuggled into the United States. Some of these women owe as much as \$50K for their illegal entrance and many arrived from locations as distant as Eastern Europe. Florida ABT has developed a methodology to quickly identify these women and provide them the opportunity to speak to agents outside of their groups. These successful "meetings" have provided intelligence on how Beverage Girl operations are structured and managed. Working with task forces comprised of local and federal authorities, the owners of four licensed locations in south Florida have been indicted to date.


Israel Morrow, Assistant Director for Operations, North Carolina Department of Public Safety, Alcohol Law Enforcement, NLLEA President

In 2023, John was tasked with developing Delaware's first Marijuana Enforcement Team to regulate the adult recreational use marketplace and develop a task force model for enforcement of marijuana laws in Delaware through collaboration with the Department of Agriculture, the Division of Public Health, and the Division of Revenue.

Prior to his appointment as Chief, John Yeomans retired as a Captain from the Delaware State Police in 2007 after 25 years of service. During his tenure with the Delaware State Police, John Yeomans held a variety of roles including Troop Commander, Director of Human Resources,

Director of Public Information Office, Internal Affairs, Homicide, Executive Staff Support, Criminal Investigations, and Patrol. He co-founded and served as team coordinator for the State Police Critical Incident Stress Management Team, which provides support for both sworn and civilian personnel involved in traumatic job-related incidents.

Major Claire Espada-Diaz, Florida Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco, Bureau of Law Enforcement, Southern Region



Claire Espada-Diaz serves as Florida's Southern Region Major for the Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco, Bureau of Enforcement. In this role, Major Espada-Diaz manages six (6) District Offices from Tampa to Miami. Major Espada-Diaz has been with the Bureau for 14 years and during her service has led her team in successful major cases ranging from Tied House Evil violations to organized cargo theft investigations totaling millions of dollars in recoveries. While managing high profile cases, Major Espada-Diaz and her team still accomplishes the Bureau's work of educating licensees and deterring underaged access to alcoholic beverages and tobacco products.

Captain Alex Morales, Florida Division of Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco, Bureau of Law Enforcement



Captain Alex Morales is currently part of Florida's ABT (Alcoholic Beverages and Tobacco) bureau of enforcement. As a member of ABT he is currently in charge of the Miami- District Office. As the district Supervisor Captain Alex Morales has been involved in multiple hi-profile beverage and tobacco investigations.

Captain Alex Morales obtained a criminal justice degree from MacMurray University in Illinois. His law enforcement career stems 3 decades. He started in 1994 as a Police Officer for the city of North Miami Beach. He worked multiple units within the police department. Captain Morales started his career as a road patrol officer, then became a detective assigned



to the community policing unit. Captain Morales then went to investigations as a General Investigations Detective. Captain Morales was then promoted to Corporal and specialized in gang investigations. Captain Morales was then promoted to Sergeant where he ran community policing, Marine Patrol and the Dive Team.

Captain Morales was part of multiple specialized units; Maine Patrol, Dive Team, School Resource Officer (SRO), Special Response Team (SRT), Bike Patrol and Crisis Negotiation Team (CNT).
