It's no secret that the West Valley has experienced immense growth in the last decade, now exceeding 1.8 million residents. In order to match the exponential growth throughout the region, additional healthcare options needed to be provided for its residents.

To continue the influx of healthcare options in the West Valley, on February 6, El Mirage welcomed the community to a groundbreaking ceremony on what will be the city's first emergency room in the area. The 7,500 square foot facility, located at 12000 N El Mirage Road, is set to open Fall 2023.

CTCA will now be called City of Hope Phoenix.
