The USPTO's New Revised §101 and 112 Guidance: Substance and Strategies

Wednesday, June 26th • 9:00am - 10:00am

The panel will review the recently-released USPTO Guidelines for applying §101 and §112, which were promulgated to guide examiners and stakeholders in the USPTO's current understanding of the jurisprudence around patent eligibility. Their goal is to assist stakeholders, examiners and ALJ's as they prosecute and examine patent applications and conduct relevant PTAB proceedings.

The panel will also touch briefly on the stakeholder roundtable process and resulting draft legislation in the Senate which would amend 35 U.S.C. §§ 100, 101, and 112, also with the goal of reforming and clarifying the statutes, also in light of current federal jurisprudence.

Marc S. Adler

He then ran his own ip consultancy for about 10 years before becoming Of Counsel to Buchanan in 2017. He is an Emeritus Past President of ACPC, and Past President of IPO. He is currently a member of the Board of Directors of the IPO Education Foundation, and is working with the Sedona group on a white paper on trade secret management and protection.

Marc received his JD from St John's University and is admitted in New York, the CAFC and many federal jurisdictions. He has undergraduate and graduate degrees in Chemical Engineering.

Huw Beverley-Smith is a Partner in the Technology Transactions Group at Faegre Baker Daniels LLP in London. Huw acts for customers and suppliers on a wide range of international technology transactions and regulatory issues, including technology, telecommunications and business process outsourcing, complex services agreements, intellectual property ownership and licensing.



Huw has advised on international privacy compliance programs, particularly in respect of the EU General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR), for U.S. and European clients in numerous sectors, including pharmaceutical companies, medical device manufacturers, banks, insurers, IT and telecom vendors, publishers and retailers. He also has a broad ranging technology transactions practice and advises on IP issues on international transactions throughout EMEA, the U.S. and Asia.

Huw is the author of several books and articles on intellectual property and privacy, including *Privacy, Property and Personality* (Cambridge University Press, 2009) and most recently “Rights in Data and Information” in the *Oxford Handbook of Intellectual Property Law* (Oxford University Press, 2018). Huw received his LLB and PhD from the University of Wales and was a Research Fellow at the Max-Planck Institute for Intellectual Property Law and Competition Law in Munich, Germany, prior to practicing in London.

Andrew Bowler

Andrew Bowler is a partner in Bristows LLP (London) and has represented clients in the area of IP litigation for 20 years. Andy has handled many high-tech patent cases for multinational companies in cases in the UK High Court, the IP Enterprise Court and the Court of Appeal. He is regularly involved in the co-ordination of proceedings with parallel actions elsewhere in the EU and US and also has experience of litigation in China.



Andy has a keen interest in the developing legal area of FRAND dispute resolution having acted in several of the key recent SEP/FRAND disputes in the UK.

His recent SEP/FRAND experience includes securing a win for Samsung as part of the defence of patent litigation proceedings brought by Unwired Planet against Samsung, Google and Huawei. He is also leading ZTE’s defence of the SEP/FRAND proceedings brought by Conversant against ZTE and Huawei. Clients describe Andy as “very pragmatic, sensitive to business goals, forward-thinking and manages cases well from start to end.”

Tom Brown

Tom Brown is a Senior Legal Director at Dell, where he manages intellectual property litigation and post-grant review proceedings. Before joining Dell, he was a litigation principal at Fish & Richardson, and was previously a software design engineer at Microsoft.



John Cheek

John Cheek is Chief IP Counsel for Fortune 500 technology and manufacturing leader Tenneco Inc. (NYSE: TEN), one of the world's leading designers, manufacturers and distributors of clean air and ride performance products and systems for the automotive, commercial truck and off-highway markets and the aftermarket. Prior to joining Tenneco in 2017, Mr. Cheek was Senior Corporate Counsel/Managing Attorney with Caterpillar Inc., the world's leading manufacturer of construction and mining equipment, diesel and natural gas engines, locomotives, and industrial gas turbines, where he served in leadership roles in the United States and Europe. Mr. Cheek is also an active supporter of civil legal aid, most recently serving as Vice President of Prairie State Legal Services. Prior to joining Caterpillar in 1997, Mr. Cheek was in private practice in Dayton, Ohio. Mr. Cheek received an undergraduate degree in Mathematics and Economics from Wabash College and completed additional undergraduate studies in Physics and Mechanical Engineering at the University of Dayton and Bradley University. He also received a Juris Doctor from the University of Dayton and a Masters of Business Administration from the University of Chicago's Booth School of Business. He is a regular lecturer on intellectual property strategy and management at the Kellogg School of Management at Northwestern University.



Barak Cohen

Barak Cohen is the Litigation lead in Perkins Coie’s Washington, D.C. office. As a former prosecutor at the U.S. Department of Justice, Barak led numerous white collar and computer crime investigations in jurisdictions throughout the U.S. His background informs his representation of companies and individuals in international and U.S.-based internal investigations and high-stakes government investigations involving the Department of Justice, legislative committees, the Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) of the U.S. Treasury Department, and inspectors general, as well as state authorities and regulatory agencies. Barak also represents clients in the parallel civil litigation that often accompanies government investigations. His government background gives him particular experience in providing compliance advice and drafting policies that help companies anticipate and avoid government scrutiny in highly regulated industries, including the healthcare and defense industries, among others.



Barak’s experience has most recently focused on matters involving the False Claims Act and Anti-Kickback Statute; international investigations relating to foreign corruption offenses, such as the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act (FCPA) and UK Bribery Act, and export control violations in diverse locations such as Latin America, Asia, Russia and Europe; bid-rigging; conflicts of interest and corruption involving senior government officials; election crimes; and trade secret theft under the Economic Espionage Act. Barak has particular experience in highly regulated industries, such as pharmaceutical and medical device manufacturing and sales, and the defense industry.

Before becoming an attorney, Barak served as an infantry officer in the U.S. Army. Barak established Perkins Coie’s firmwide Veterans’ Affinity Group to help promote veterans’ issues.

Q. Todd Dickinson is Senior Partner at the law firm Polsinelli, PC, in Washington DC, where he heads the Intellectual Property Public Policy practice group. With almost 40 years of experience, Mr. Dickinson has a broad and unique background in all aspects of IP.



He previously served as the Undersecretary of Commerce for Intellectual Property and Director of the U.S. Patent and Trademark Office under President Clinton. He was also Vice President and Chief IP Counsel of the General Electric Co., and most recently as the Executive Director of the American Intellectual Property Law Association (AIPLA), one of the largest IP organizations in the world.

Having wide-ranging international IP experience, he is a frequent lecturer on IP topics and advisor to IP owners and policy makers around the world. Among many honors, Mr. Dickinson has been named to the IAM *Intellectual Property Hall of Fame* and has been listed a number of times as one of the “50 Most Influential People in IP”.

Seth P. Waxman

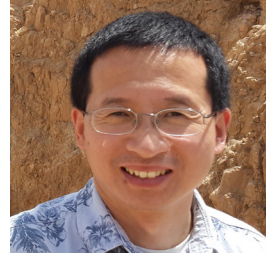

A casual and cozy spot for after-work cocktails offering a menu of Jack Daniel's-inspired upscale bar food and drink specials.

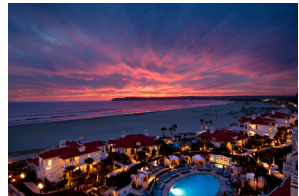
