WHERE TO GET STARTED



- Contrast Checker: Tool to check your background and text for accessibility
- Descriptive Alt Text: Written description of images

Auditory Accessibility

- Closed captioning: Time-synchronized text to go along with video
- Transcripts: Text accompaniment to audio

Language Accessibility

- Translation Tools: Identifying content language can help screen readers
- Accessible Language: avoiding idioms, jargon, and other easily misinterpreted words to help a broad audience understand

User Experience



- Ease of Navigation: The ability to move through a website on different types of devices
- Screen reader: software that translates text and provides instructions on how to interact with a content on a screen
