

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

## **Diary Opens A Door to Illinois History** ...And a Look at the Weather, Too!

It's not every day you can step back in time... down to the day...and the minute.

But that's what historian Curtis Mann will be doing on Tuesday, March 19 and you're invited to come along!

Mann, the recently retired head of the Sangamon Valley Collection at the City of Spring-




field's Lincoln Library, will be back in a familiar the Carnegie Room on the Library's first floor, for a Sangamon County Historical Society program discussing the life (and diary) of Edward W. Morse, a Springfield businessman who kept a diary of his daily activities while living in Springfield in 1856...and the daily weather. The free pro-

gram begins at 5:30 p.m. and is open to the public as well as Society members and their guests.

"Morse's diary provides fascinating details about Springfield and his employment as a store clerk," says Mann. "Later in the year, Morse begins a career as a traveling salesman and recounts his extensive trip selling medicine in southern Illinois," providing an unusual firsthand man-in-the-street account of what life was like at a key time in history.

Mann, the city historian and author, has spent decades researching a variety of subjects relating to local, regional and state history. A past president of the Society, in June he became only the second person in the history of SCHS to be presented with the organization's Lifetime
