February Program at Lincoln Library History of the Illinois National Guard and Camp Lincoln

Tuesday, February 18 5:30 pm at Lincoln Library -Carnegie Room

Do you know when and how the Illinois National Guard was formed? What was it called before it became the Illinois National Guard? Where was the first location? Do you know when and how Springfield was selected as the home of Camp Lincoln?

Adriana Schroeder, Command Historian of the Illinois National Guard, will share the beginnings of the National Guard and how Camp Lincoln came about. Camp Lincoln, named after Abraham Lincoln, is the headquarters of the Illinois National Guard and the 129th Regiment Regional Training Institute (RTI). The Institute trains current and future leaders in skills and traits necessary to lead, train, coach, and mentor soldiers to United States Army standards.

Ms. Schroeder has served as the Illinois National Guard Command Historian since 2009. She is responsible for collecting,

archiving, and cataloging the missions, exercises, personnel and events of both the Illinois Army and Illinois Air National Guard. Additionally, she advises the Illinois National Guard command on matters related to force integration, unit federal designations, and all other areas related to history. Ms. Schroeder conducts and leads the organization's history education program and conducts research and writing projects.

Her research has been published in a number of professional journals including the Encyclopedia of Oklahoma History and Culture, and her work has been cited in several documentaries and historical non-fiction books.


