## January Program at Lincoln Library Sangamon County Poor Farm

Tuesday, January 21 5:30 pm at Lincoln Library -Carnegie Room

The Sangamon County Poor Farm operated near Buffalo from 1870 to 1944. For those 70-plus years, the farm was, literally, the home of last resort for Sangamon County's unluckiest residents – anyone who was too old, poor or feeble to take care of themselves and had no friends or relatives willing to take them in.

Mike Kienzler, the editor of SangamonLink.org, the historical society's online encyclopedia, will discuss the poor farm's history, its residents and its management. Those attending this presentation also will see long-lost portraits of eight residents of the farm, portraits that were drawn in 1912 or 1913 and then disappeared for more than a century, until Kienzler discovered them when researching something else.

Mike Kienzler, a Springfield native, spent not quite 40 years as an





editor and reporter with The State Journal-Register. After retiring in 2013, he became SangamonLink's founding editor.

SangamonLink now boasts more than 1,500 entries (and counting) on all aspects of Sangamon County history.

April 15 – The Marbold House- History, Restoration and New Life. Once part of Sangamon County, the area near Greenview, Illinois, was where John Marbold settled and built his mansion. Acquired by the Marbold Association in 2011, the group has transformed a rat and termite-infested, deteriorating building into the splendor it once had.

## **Conklings Come to Life**

Attendees gathered at the Art Association for the November program on the Conkling family and were taken back to the 1860's. Many came away realizing much has changed since that time, but much is still the same – parents worrying about their child at college and urging good conduct, a college student forging a new life and asking for more money, as well as the many current issues affecting people's lives whether that was 1860 or 2025.



Allicent Smith

Allicent Smith led the presentation about the Conkling family. Allicent accessed letters written by James Conkling, his wife, Mercie, and Clinton, their son, who was studying at Yale, during the time Lincoln was elected president and the Civil War erupted. Tom Ryder (James), Linda Schneider (Mercie), and Josh Ryder (Clinton), in period costume read excerpts from letters between the couple and their son. As the Conklings were friends of Abraham Lincoln, Clinton took photos of Lincoln with him to college and in his letters asks his parents to send more as schoolmates

wanted pictures of Lincoln. James often writes that he is sending money but expects Clinton to keep track of costs 'per the enclosed form'; Mercie reminds her son to "keep your Christian faith" and to "attend to your studies"; Clinton asks his mother to tell the young ladies that "I haven't forgotten them" and asks his father for money for a "worn coat."



Through the letters and Allicent's narrative, information about the times becomes illuminated: the reactions to the Civil War, losses of sons from Springfield families, the antagonism between the Democrats and Republicans in town, the Springfield women preparing bandages for soldiers, the creation of Camp Butler, deaths from typhoid, etc.

There is also a member app that can be downloaded to your cell phone. Search for Member Plus in the app store. You will be able to view the calendar of events and programs, view and pay invoices, view and






register for events, read blog posts, and more. You can set it to receive push notifications so you will always know when new information is added.
