



November Program - Springfield from 1860-1880s as heard through the voices of the Conkling Family



Tuesday, November 19 5:30 pm at Springfield Art Association

Allicent Smith, a frequent presenter for the Society, will share information on James Cook Conkling and his wife, Mercy, and son, Clinton. Smith has done extensive research which includes letters written by the family to each other. These letters, written during the Civil War, provide an intimate look into the Conkling family dynamics, including how the Civil War was impacting life in Springfield, as well as Springfield's economic conditions, life at Camp Butler, plans for the Home of the Friendless, societal news and parents well-intended strategies to keep their son on a respected and moral path. Post Civil War correspondence connects the Conkling family with the planning of the final resting place of President Lincoln and the forming of the Lincoln Guard of Honor.



Moving Pillsbury Forward

Our October program was another packed house, this time held at the Springfield Art Association. Chris Richmond told the history of Pillsbury Mill and the work that has been going on since the group, Moving Pillsbury Forward, took possession of the 18-acre site in 2022. Richmond shared moving stories of employees who have provided insight into the workings of the plant and have donated artifacts.

It was in April 1929 that the Pillsbury Company, headquartered in Minneapolis, expanded operations. With wheat as a stable crop in the Springfield area and train tracks close by, the Springfield site was chosen. The mill produced flour, and even the batter for Kentucky Fried Chicken.

Over the years buildings were added, the mill set production records, and the number of employees increased from 300 in 1930, to 858 in 1937 and by 1955 there were 1500 employees. The mill operated until 1991 when it was sold to Cargill; with mechanization the work force had been reduced to 450; the mill shut down in 2001 and sat abandoned until 2008 when it was sold for scrap. Another scrap metal company used demolition that exposed asbestos which required a \$3M cleanup in 2018.





From Tuesdays at Dock #107, open days when people could stop by the site, Richmond and his group met many former Pillsbury employees. Phil Aiello, a grain handler, helped Richmond learn about the Tripper machine, still standing in a silo. Dave Kelly, a millwright, could point to the exact spot where his locker once stood and then revealed his dad's locker was next to his. Others came forward with a 1946 seniority list of the union workers, pictures of the Pillsbury bowling team, a huge rolodex with hundreds of cards listing companies that supplied parts, a 1930s blueprint of one of the buildings which will be key for engineers to determine the best way to take down the structure.

What's next? Photos are being taken to document the site; oral histories have been recorded, the names of all employees have been added to a wall at the site, a site survey and historical records survey have been completed, the group is now a 501c3 not-for-profit, and \$9M has been committed to cleaning up and cleaning the property for redevelopment. The project completion is anticipated within 24 months.

Cemetery Walk 2024


On a beautiful fall day, 450 people came out to Oak Ridge Cemetery for the Sangamon County Historical




