Cemetery Walk September 29

"Echoes of Yesteryear: A Walk through Oak Ridge Cemetery" will be held from noon – 3:30 p.m. Sunday, September 29. (The last tour begins at 3:00 p.m.). The free walking tour is sponsored by the Sangamon County Historical Society in cooperation with Oak Ridge Cemetery, 1441 Monument Avenue, Springfield. Seven actors dressed in period costumes will tell the personal stories of individuals buried at Oak Ridge Cemetery who made significant contributions to our community's early history.

Attendees will be transported by bus to the first gravesite, then walk to the others before boarding the bus back to the parking area. The walk is

approximately one-half mile.

The event is free and open to the public; however, donations are suggested.

Parking is available in designated areas and refreshments will be available for purchase.

Join Illinois State Museum curator of history, Erika Holst, to learn more about the rise and fall of Hutchinson's Cemetery, from its start in 1843 as undertaker John Hutchinson's "side hustle," through its heyday in the 1840's and 50's, to its decline in the latter part of the 19th century, and finally to its second and third acts as a park and eventual site of

Springfield High School. Learn about those who were buried at Hutchinson's, then moved and re-buried at Oak Ridge, and how they were remembered – and sometimes forgotten.

Transportation Hub - Display of Court Houses

The Sangamon County Historical Society has provided a display of Sangamon County courthouses inside the new Transportation Hub at 111 S. 11th St. Thanks to Stephanie Martin, manager of the Sangamon Valley Collection and Society board member, for her work in researching and finding photos of the various buildings that housed county government offices. The first building, a 20-foot-long log cabin, stood on the northwest corner of Second and Jefferson Streets, and served the county from 1821-1825. Three other courthouses served the area until the fourth major building – what we now call the Old State Capitol - was built in 1845-1846. The photos and artifacts will be on display throughout the fall.

Alvera Knox Leaves Donation to the Society

The Sangamon County Historical Society has received a generous donation of \$45,000 from the estate of Alvera Knox (1936-2023) who was a long-time member of the Society.



Alvera was employed as a school librarian in Springfield District 186 for 26 years. She served on the committee formed by the Springfield mayor and the city council in 1994 to recommend ways to memorialize Springfield's 1908 Race Riot. The major products of the committee were the design of the Race Riot Walking Tour and the creation of "Springfield Had No Shame," a video used to educate Springfield students about the riot which was recently shown at Lincoln Library.

Grants Awarded at Annual Meeting

The Sangamon County Historical Society awarded three grants at the annual meeting on June 15th. The grants were presented by committee chair, Scott Pillsbury.

Oak Ridge Cemetery

Oak Ridge Cemetery was awarded \$600 for six Springfield underground railroad conductor grave markers. In the last year a statewide task force was created, led by John C. Ackerman, County Clerk of Tazewell County, to recognize the dangerous work of being an Underground Railroad Conductor in Illinois. Six conductors were honored at the Society's May program for their work in Springfield, IL and in Sangamon County. The grant will fund the gravesite markers for these brave men, recognizing their place in history.

Prairie Skies Public Library District

The Prairie Skies Public Library
District was awarded \$1,000 for the
digitization of microfilm for three
newspapers surrounding Pleasant
Plains: The Pleasant Plains Press,
the Review, and the Argus. The
Pleasant Plains Press ran from 1922
to 2020, then was combined with
the New Berlin Bee before several

newspapers were combined as South County Publications. The Review ran from 1900-1901 and the Argus ran from 1922-1934.

The Thomas Reed Memorial Carillon was awarded \$1,000 to produce an educational video that can be used in school classrooms. Brian Barstead joins the Society Board

We welcome Brian Barstead to the Board. Recently retired after 37 years as a private wealth manager with Ameriprise, Brian has been involved in many projects in the Springfield community. He has been active in the Springfield



Sunrise Rotary since 1990 and currently is the assistant area Rotary Foundation coordinator for downstate Illinois clubs. He has always had an interest in history and has spearheaded several initiatives over the years – the 70th anniversary of the Springfield Municipal Band in 2006 and the Rotary's Hats Off to Mr. Lincoln art project in 2008 in which artists designed large and small fiberglass stovetop hats. Many can still be seen around town. With Brian's background in finance and fun projects, his talents will be a welcome addition to our board.



Costumed re-enactors will portray the following historic figures at the Cemetery Walk:

Susan Moore (1841-1907) was a young blind woman living in an Arkansas orphanage during the Civil War. In 1864 she and other Civil War refugees were moved to Springfield where she became a resident at the Home for the Friendless, which was originally established to house impoverished elderly women and orphans.

John J. Bird (1844-1912), a political activist who supported Black civil rights, was elected Police Magistrate in Cairo, Ill., before moving to Springfield. He worked as a janitor at the Statehouse and became the first African-



American trustee of the University of Illinois more than a decade before the school enrolled any Black students.

Emma Bressmer (1860-1941) served as Vice President of Bressmer's Department store after her father and brother died. A full-fledged department store, it was one of the most important stores in Springfield for nine decades, carrying quality furniture, toys and clothing for people of all ages.

Pauline Deutsch Redlich (1849-1883) was the daughter of the first Jewish rabbi in Springfield, Bernard Deutsch. Twenty families formed the Springfield Hebrew Congregation in 1858. Rabbi Deutsch, an immigrant from Bohemia, served the congregation from 1866 to 1878.

Alfred Piquenard (1826-1876) was a Frenchman who became a captain in the US Civil War, where he commanded a company of construction engineers. In 1870 he moved his family to Springfield and embarked on a career in architecture, which included designing the new Illinois State Capitol.



Ellen Huntington Henkle (1853-1919) was, in her day, considered to be Springfield's best singer. Born into a very musical family, she began singing at the early age of three. Because of her family lineage, she and her sisters were among the charter members of the Springfield Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution.

Reed "Kidd" Waddell (1860-1895) was a smooth con artist and jack-of-all-trades international hustler who is often credited with inventing the gold brick fraud. He actually sold the Brooklyn Bridge. A precocious criminal, he was
