Cemetery Walk October 5

"Echoes of Yesteryear: A Walk through Oak Ridge Cemetery" will be held from noon – 3:30 p.m. Sunday, October 5. (The last tour begins at 3:00 p.m.). The free walking tour is sponsored by the Sangamon County Historical Society in cooperation with Oak Ridge Cemetery, 1441 Monument Avenue, Springfield. Seven actors dressed in period costumes will tell the personal stories of individuals buried at Oak Ridge Cemetery who made significant contributions to our community's early history.

Attendees will be transported by bus to the first gravesite, then walk to the others before boarding the bus back to the parking area. The walk is approximately one-half mile.


The event is free and open to the public; however, donations are greatly appreciated.

Saving History - One Marble at a Time: Paul Golladay will present the history of military headstones issued to Civil War soldiers, even to Confederate soldiers, and the work of cleaning military headstones. Golladay heads up the volunteers and the work of the not-for-profit Sucker State Preservation Foundation. Many days the group heads out to Oak Ridge Cemetery and other cemeteries to clean, reset and restore military headstones. Hear about the work and where Sucker State originates. Golladay has 21 years in active duty with the Army National Guard and currently is the manager of the officer candidate school. He worked for the National Park Service at Lincoln's Home and was the assistant museum curator for the Illinois State Military Museum.

Echos of Yesteryear Cemetery Walk

October 5

at Oak Ridge Cemetery

Costumed re-enactors will portray the following historic figures at the Cemetery Walk:

Johei Okuhara (1876-1919) was an immigrant from Japan. He worked as a photographer, specializing in photographing subjects in front of a Japanese style background. He was close friends with prominent Springfield businessman John Bretz.

Eva Carroll Monroe (1869-1950), founded the Lincoln Colored Home in 1898, the first orphanage for African-American children in Sangamon County. The home housed elderly women as well as children. Monroe worked as its Matron until 1933, when the State of Illinois did not renew its license, forcing it to close.



Amos Duncan (1890-1945) was one of the few African-American police officers in Springfield in the early 20th century. He was a Republican precinct committeeman and entrepreneur, owning the original Dreamland Park, a laundry, several taverns and a movie theater.

Frederick Streckfuss (1852-1924) was a Lutheran minister and professor of Concordia Theological Seminary, which educated Missouri Synod Lutheran ministers in Springfield. He spoke several languages including English, German, Hebrew, Slovak, Lithuanian and Polish, and was able to communicate with coal miners who had immigrated from Eastern European countries.



Adelaide Garden DeFrates (1850-1930) and her husband Manuel were immigrants from the island of Madeira (now Portugal). They worked for the American Hemp Company making rope. Manuel was a Republican precinct committeeman and a leader of the Portuguese Marines marching group.



Edris Mabie (1894-1935) worked in the coal mines like his immigrant father from Wales. When the United Miner Workers laid miners off and cut their wages, Mabie left and organized the Progressive Miners of America. Many fights resulted from that split. On Easter Sunday of 1935 he was killed in a deadly union war outside a saloon in downtown Springfield.

Alex Karon (1893-1972) immigrated from Greece and became a long-time proprietor of the Sugar Bowl Confectionery at State Street and South Grand. The eatery drew people from all walks of life including state governors like Henry Horner and William Stratton. But teenagers were the heart and soul of the Sugar Bowl's business.

The Cathedral Church of St. Paul the Apostle – Historical Museum & Library - Glass Door Display case & Bookcases

The Cathedral is planning a historical Museum & Library room with a focus on the history of the Cathedral and its connection to Abraham Lincoln and his marriage to Mary Todd, which was officiated by Reverend Charles Dresser, Rector of the St. Paul Cathedral from 1838-1854, The Museum will feature historical artifacts, Lincoln-related items, and educational resources. It will be open to the public.

Enos Park Neighborhood Improvement Association – Digitization of the Fever River Architectural Study of Enos Park

Enos Park was platted in 1833 and by the early 20th century nearly all Enos Park was developed and the neighborhood established itself with many movers and shakers of Springfield residing within its boundaries. The Fever Study was a historical record of all buildings within the neighborhood as of 1997. Digitized copies will be available at no cost & will protect the safety of this archival knowledge for historians, past and future residents and serve as a Springfield history resource.


