Aurora honored on many fronts

It may be referred to as the metro area's second city, but there is nothing second class about Aurora. The city was recently honored by both the National Civic League and Salary.com, and its newest healthcare facility was also honored.

Aurora is All America City

A team of 25 representing all walks of life in Aurora took their story to the All America City competition in Tampa and emerged a winner. "We are so proud to be named All-America City by the National Civic League, exclaimed City Manager Ron Miller. "This prestigious award recognizes our city's outstanding partnerships and the valuable accomplishments that benefit the city's quality of life for all residents."

The All-America City Award, is considered the 'Oscar' for communities of all sizes, noted National Civic League President Gloria Rubio-Cortes. "It recognizes the efforts of entire communities and exemplifies extensive civic engagement."

The competition required a presentation showcasing two projects that successfully addressed key challenges in the community and one youth project. The Aurora delegation that included **The Chamber**, the **Fitzsimons Redevelopment Authority**, **Aurora Economic Development Council** and many others, gave a dynamic presentation on the redevelopment of the Fitzsimons Life Science District, the city's Immigrant Integration Project and the after school program COMPASS-Coalition of Many Providing After School Success.

The benefits of the award include heightened national attention, civic pride, and a proven economic impact.



"Quality of life is clearly a deciding factor for companies bringing new jobs to a city," stated Kim Stuart, Director of Communications for the **City of Aurora**. "The All-America City title speaks volumes about all Aurora has to offer."

Aurora at top of places to build personal wealth

Finishing second only to Plano, Texas, the **City of Aurora** was named as one of the best places to build personal wealth in the United States according to Salary.com. Using their 2008 Salary Value Index they showed that the Aurora had a very favorable combination of pay and cost of living. **The Chamber** President Kevin Hougen said he was pleased, but not surprised with the results. "When you weigh all the factors, Aurora really is a great place to live and build personal growth," he stated. The Salary Value Index study was based on local salaries, cost of living and unemployment relative to the national average. According to Salary.com, the study represents cities with tremendous workforce and employer

diversity and a sense of livability.

Eastern Metro Healthcare in good hands

University of Colorado Hospital (HCH) located in Aurora has once again been named one of the nation's best medical centers. The hospital was ranked in the top 25 in the nation in six of 16 medical specialties, according to the latest "America's Best Hospitals" survey by U.S. News & World Report. **University of Colorado Hospital (HCH)** was the only hospital in Colorado to be named in four of the six categories.

U.S. News & World Report cited the hospital as one of the best in the nation for endocrinology, gynecology, kidney disease, respiratory disorders, rehabilitation medicine, and rheumatology. It is the 14th consecutive year the magazine has listed **UCH** as among the nation's elite in various specialties.

And just up the road, **The Medical Center of Aurora** has been named a Cardiovascular Center of Excellence making Aurora one of "the safest places to have a heart attack."

Boettcher Foundation, Webb-Waring and CU Partner to Support Medical Research

Colorado's medical research industry will receive a boost of up to \$40 million by the creation of a grant program aimed at advancing medical research. The program is the result of an innovative agreement among the Boettcher Foundation, the Webb-Waring Institute for Biomedical Research and the **University of Colorado**. WWI will join University of Colorado's new research hub on the Anschutz Medical Campus.

The Boettcher Foundation will contribute up to \$20 million to advance medical research in Colorado to match funding from the Webb-Waring Institute for Biomedical Research and CU, which are contributing about \$14 million and \$6 million, respectively.

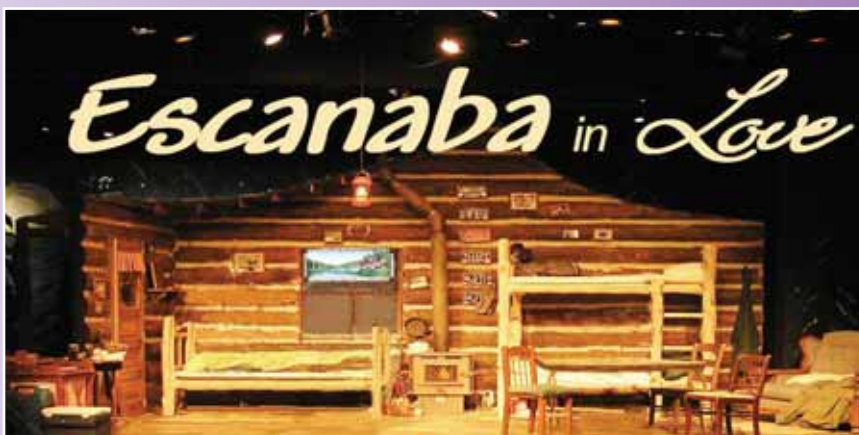


Fox Gala brings back popular characters
