CLASS PROJECT

ABC Collective

formerly Paris Elementary School

The LA Class of 2025 chose ABC Collective as our class project. Paris Elementary closed its doors in June 2023 after the Aurora Public School Board voted to close it down due to low enrollment. In June 2024, the former school found a new life as ABC Collective.

ABC Collective is a community hub for education, workforce development, community support and overall wellbeing. They strive to educate teens and young adults in building sustainable resources for life skills, and healthy relationships and careers through arts, sports, and other activities.

ABC Collective offers unique spaces for mental health and wellness professionals - including a music studio, fashion lab, podcast suite, gaming corner, and barbershop. The unique spaces allow youth to connect to therapeutic services when they might otherwise shy away from therapy in a usual, common setting.

Choosing ABC Collective as the class project was a huge undertaking because the space is massive. We were able to tour the building and gain an understanding of what spaces the staff and clients wanted refreshed. The patio, the girl's room, and the meditation space were identified as the spaces to design and furnish. We were also able to relocate the library and refresh the signage. We met the young ladies that would use the Girls Room to get an idea of how the space would be used and what they wanted in their space.

Leadership Aurora is thrilled to be a part of the genesis of this community space, and we hope the ABC Collective has a positive impact on the community for years to come.

This discussion covered how companies are incentivized to bring their operations to Aurora.

Munson then introduced Pelsue's business model, highlighting its role in engineering and manufacturing safety and telecommunication equipment. We toured the facility to see their design and production processes firsthand.

Next, we visited Stanley Marketplace, where we enjoyed lunch hosted by Visit Aurora and heard from COO Randi Morritt about tourism's impact on local business growth. A scavenger hunt helped us explore the diverse businesses within the marketplace, a community hub for more than 50 small businesses.

At the Town Center at Aurora, we participated in a Q&A with mall management and learned about operations and community engagement. We also enjoyed dessert from local business, La Micochana.

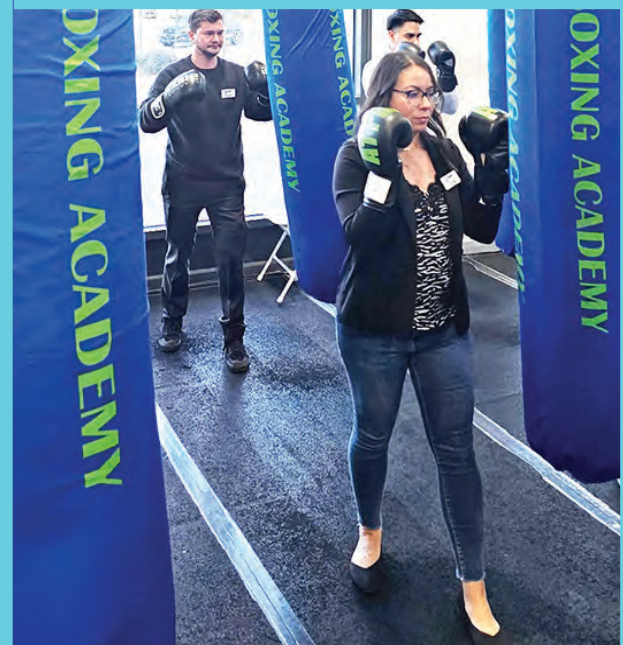
While at the Town Center, we visited Local Love, a shoe store run by Nigel Hines, who shared his buy-sell-trade business model and philanthropic efforts, including donating 1,000 pairs of shoes annually to kids in need.

We ended the day watching powerful, student-made films and participated in a thoughtful Q&A with the filmmakers. Final remarks from CCA’s President Dr. Mordecai Brownlee, capped off a day filled with innovation, insight, and inspiration. We walked away with a deeper understanding of Aurora’s educational landscape — and a renewed appreciation for the dedication behind every student’s success. HEALTHCARE DAY



Healthcare Day was a bit of an eye-opener for many of us.

We started the day at Children's Hospital Colorado. Chief Strategy Officer Raphe Schwartz welcomed us with a summary of what happens at this amazing hospital. The class was then introduced to the hard-working Child Life Specialists and the MD's they work with. MD's as in Medical Dogs, not actual doctors but in some ways just as helpful. Then, we toured the hospital and some of the specialized care sections: The Gait lab; Fetal Care Center; Simulation "sim" Lab; and the Pediatric Mental Health Institute.

After a quick group project of making cheer cards and cozy fleece blankets for patients, we headed to the Rocky Mountain Regional VA Medical Center.

We were welcomed at the VA with an overview of all they do for veterans. This was followed by an insightful discussion about suicide prevention for veterans.

We learned about the Fisher House, a "home away from home" for Veterans' families, and visited the Spinal Cord Injury Unit. Then, we were given an "exclusive" tour of the facility, including the massive underground hallways, which connect everything.

To wrap up this amazing day, we were joined by VA Interim Director Paul Roberts, who has a passion to help as many veterans as possible. At times he brought tears to my eyes and goosebumps to my arms. And as I looked around at veterans in our class, I saw genuine joy and pride in their faces as Roberts spoke of his goals for this sometimes-forgotten group of warriors.

MILITARY DAY

For the Leadership Aurora Class of 2025, Military day gave us a detailed look into some of Buckley Space Force's unique history, and present-day declassified missions.

Formally established in June of 1941, the War Department named the base in honor of Longmont veteran 1Lt. John Harold Buckley. Over the course of its history, Buckley was an Air National Guard Base, Air Force Base, and most recently has become a Space Force Base.

While it has been dedicated to multiple branches of the armed forces, Buckley houses members from all branches of the military, with a substantial portion being Airmen. Outside of learning some history of the base and being briefed on missions like Space Delta 4, we also got to tour the 140 WG Flightline hangar.

After lunch, we listened to an exceptional panel of Junior Enlisted armed forces members, who shared their personal journeys of joining various branches of the military, and what their jobs were.

My personal favorite part of the day was our last activity where we visited the Army Aviation Facility and got to go inside Black Hawk and Chinook helicopters!

POLICE DAY



Police Day for Leadership Aurora Class of 2025 was a fun-filled and packed day!

We had opening remarks from Deputy Chief of Police Chris Juul. He provided great insight on the Aurora Police Department and statistical information about the department, as well as sharing some of the struggles they are facing – and what they are doing to overcome them.

In addition to Juul's presentation, we learned about the great opportunities the Employee Support Unit provides to officers and their families. They have many means to help officers including a physical therapy program, confidential help lines and services, and taking care of armed forces families while deployed.

There was a presentation about the Victim Advocates program that is offered to victims of a crime. We learned that Ronald Reagan played a significant role in establishing victim rights.

The first half of the day continued with more exciting activities, including pitting cars and watching demonstrations of arrest control.

In the second half of the day, the class received a presentation on the Special Operations Unit from Lt Baginski and Sgt McElroy. The class got the opportunity to see a swat vehicle and the drones used in hostile events, and we watched K9 demonstrations – which some class members participated in by putting on the 'bite suit!'

We got to shoot at targets with semi-automatic guns (under the close supervision of trained professionals), and to finish the day the class got to watch the SWAT team blow off a door utilizing a breaching charge.

I loved every part of this day! It was highly informative and interactive.

FIRE DAY

At Fire Day, we learned firsthand that firefighters operate in high-stakes situations, often going from sleep to fully geared and en route to an emergency in under a minute. Their work also carries serious health risks — cancer from gear exposure, heart disease, and PTSD among them. To support wellness, Aurora Fire Department has a peer support program and plans to add a therapy dog. In addition, an on-site physical therapy clinic supports firefighters with 3,500 annual visits, reinforcing wellness and resilience.

Aurora has 17 fire stations, with crews working 24-hour shifts followed by 48 hours off, plus a “Kelly Day” every sixth shift (an extra day off they would normally work in the 28-day work cycle).

The Aurora Fire Department fleet includes water-only engines, six ladder trucks, and six rescue units. Firefighters pivot quickly from downtime to intense calls. They also collect and analyze call data to improve services, and veteran staff mentor new recruits.

Diversity efforts continue at the Fire Department, as only 36 of the department’s 466 members are women, and overall diversity is under 20 percent. To support the effort of recruiting more females, Lt. Kathleen Hancock leads “Camp Spark,” an empowerment camp for girls aged 12–18, now in its sixth year. It teaches skills like confidence, professionalism, and eye contact, with a counselor supporting participants’ mental health.

Fire Chief Alec Oughton shared the department’s mission, focusing on expert, human-centered care, along with a vision of national leadership and strong community ties.

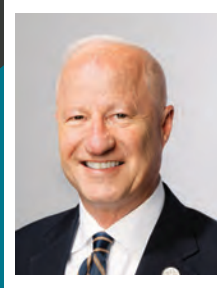

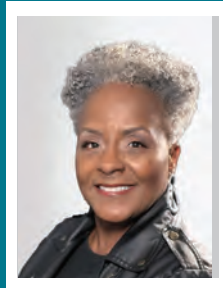
