Convention Fees

State of Illinois Mandated Courses

All mandated CE courses required by the State of Illinois for your DVM or CVT license is available on the ISVMA's website (www.isvma.org/events/upcoming-events):

DVMs: Three hours of controlled substances courses for DVMs is required. (Note that the completion of an opioid CE course is only required if a DVM holds an Illinois controlled substance license.)

DVMs must also complete one hour of sexual harassment training.

CVTs: Must only complete the sexual harassment prevention training.

Each course counts toward the required 40 hours of CE for DVMs and 15 hours of CE for CVTs each licensing cycle.

USDA Accreditation Program Training Courses - Part of this Year's Convention

Under the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA's) revised National Veterinary Accreditation Program, accreditation status expires every three years. As a requirement of renewal, each participating veterinarian must complete the mandated three or six hours of continuing education provided specifically by the USDA.

The training/educational materials can be presented live or found online. When completed at the ISVMA Annual Convention, the participating veterinarian receives credit for completing the necessary CE for renewal of his or her accreditation status. This CE also counts toward DVM license renewal.
