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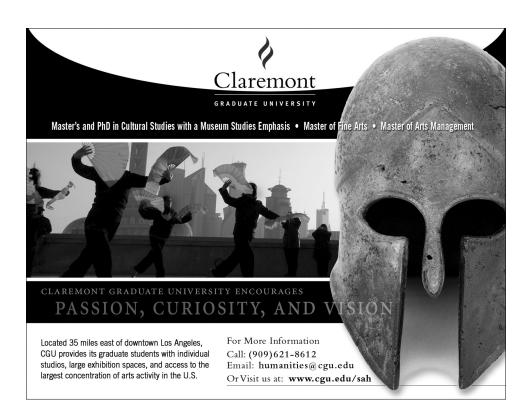




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WELCOME AND ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

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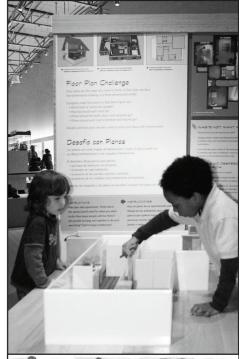
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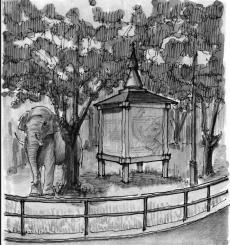
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ABOUT CAM

The California Association of Museums (CAM) was formed in 1979 and we now have over 500 members across the state. In 2010, we are celebrating 30 years of service to the California museum field!



Professional Development

Our annual conference brings museum colleagues together for an exchange of ideas, perspectives, and resources. The 2011 conference will be held in Pasadena, March 2-4. We also organize workshops to provide in-depth training in specific areas of museum work.

Publications and Surveys

We conduct and publish studies that report the needs and impact of California's museums, as well as general statistics. The biennial *Financial and Salary Survey of Museum Personnel* has been a valuable tool for museum administrators since 1986. In addition, we scour the news to stay abreast of what the media is saying about museums, pose monthly polls, and produce other publications for the benefit of the field.

Legislative Advocacy

We have an active advocacy program that monitors legislation, keeps our constituents informed and involved, and fosters strategic initiatives to support funding sources for museums. In 2009, CAM launched *CAM State of the State*, "call-ins" for members about state and federal topics.

Newsletter

An electronic newsletter, *CAM e-News*, continues to grow in popularity and has become a valued source for news and information. It features timely announcements about funding sources, professional development programs, news articles, legislative updates, and job opportunities.

Green Museums Initiative

In 2006, we took the forward-thinking step to develop a Green Museums Initiative (GMI) to inspire museums to develop green business practices, eco-friendly facility management, and sustainable programming. In 2009, our GMI committee launched a new website and the Green Museums

Accord, a pledge for museums that wish to be more eco-friendly. To learn more, see www.greenmuseums.info.

Multicultural Committee

Our Multicultural Committee serves as a catalyst for discourse and advocacy regarding multicultural issues. The long-term vision is to increase the number of underrepresented communities in museums as paid staff members, specifically those of Latino/Hispanic, African American, Asian American, Native American and Pacific Islander descent. The committee spearheaded a new program in 2009 titled CAM Fellows. Supported by a generous grant, CAM Fellows attend and network at the annual conference. They write case study essays based on session attendance and interest, which will be posted on CAM's website and *CAM e-News* starting in Summer 2010.

License Plate Campaign

We have been working with state officials to establish a special license plate program that will provide much-needed grant funding for California museums through a competitive grant process. Expect to hear more about this pivotal initiative in the very near future!

Forecasting the Future of California Museums

We are forecasting the future of California's museums in partnership with the American Association of Museums' Center for the Future of Museums, in honor of our 30th anniversary. A white paper will be released later this year proposing action for the museum field and their communities. The recommendations will address many challenges California faces in the coming decades, including increasing minority populations, water shortages, shifts in industry and finance.

Californians Connecting to Collections

The Institute of Museum and Library Services funded a California collaborative to develop a statewide preservation plan for heritage institutions. In partnership with the California Preservation Program, California State Parks, California State Library, and Historic Monterey, we are helping to coordinate this project.

State of the Art Collections Storage at de Saisset Museum, Santa Clara University, 9:00 AM - 11:00 AM / Tour the de Saisset Museum's

collections storage, which uses state-of-the-art high-density SpaceSaver power assist mobile compact shelving and the first installation of SpaceSaver's pull-out painting racks. Prior to 2005, the de Saisset Museum's 10,000-object collection of art and artifacts was stored on three levels of the facility in seven different locations. A grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities allowed the de Saisset to consolidate storage into one high-density, on-site, 2000 sq. ft. storage vault. A short presentation will describe the grant application, system selection process, construction and installation, and the outbound and inbound volunteer-powered collection moves. 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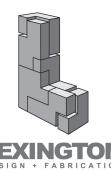

Do you have staff willing to make changes? This session will focus on the leadership of three organizations and the decisions necessary for creating a culture that embraces change.

implemented by in-house staff, using tools found readily on the internet, and how multi-touch displays allow NHM to address key findings from a front-end evaluation of the Latin American collection galleries.

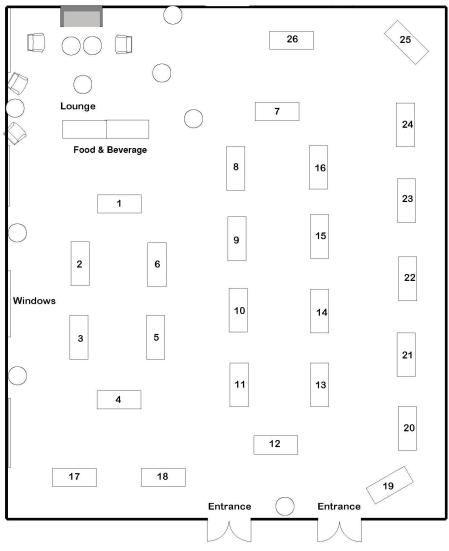
