It is an exciting time to be a member of the Academy of Human Resource Development! As is outlined in this brief report, our Academy investments clearly align with our mission. Although the significant human capital contributions made by members of this volunteer organization have not been tallied and may be incalculable, our main sources of income are annual conference fees and membership dues.
