Gov. Pritzker Announces \$175 Million Available in B2B Grants for Restaurants, Hotels and Creative Arts Businesses

CHICAGO — Governor JB Pritzker and the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity (DCEO) today announced \$175 million in available grant funding through the Back to Business (B2B) program. Following state recovery for businesses totaling nearly \$1.5 billion, the latest American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) -funded opportunity is designed to provide additional support for the hardest-hit sectors, including restaurants (B2B Restaurants), hotels (B2B Hotels), and businesses or organizations in the creative arts sector (B2B Arts). To provide hands-on support and raise awareness about the program, the State has mobilized a network of more than 100 community navigators across Illinois.

We work with our communities to learn of their services and connect people to the right resources. We bring the voices of people with disabilities to the table of discussion and advocate for increased access and inclusion for all. Our mission is to empower people with disabilities by supporting the individual and their community with the skills and knowledge to live independently.

Professional Women's Network Event

PWN hosted its Spring 2023 luncheon on March 22, 2023, at Wesley United Methodist Church. Licensed Clinical Social Worker, Susan Carlson from Sinnissippi Centers, presented on Preventing Burnout; How to Effectively Manage Stress and Anxiety. About 50 individuals attended the event and enjoyed a taco bar provided by Creative Cuisine.

Carlson shared that burnout is from prolonged stress and can lead to depression. Stress can also lead to anxiety. It comes from the invisible load that individuals carry even with the modern inventions of things like the washing machine, we still carry a lot on our plates.

In a poll from the audience, about half identified what this looks like for them – work, family/kids, imposter syndrome, planning, managing the house, etc. 45% of those surveyed said either, “I’m so tired” or “I’m exhausted”.

Carlson then presented some ways to prevent burnout, starting with doing an emotional/physical wellness check-in. How am I actually doing? Communicate with our supports on what we need help with to lighten or share the load. Prioritizing ourselves and really doing it.

She defined buzz words like:

- Mindfulness - bringing yourself back to the present moment by asking yourself: What is happening right now? Where are you physically at in the moment?
- Self-care – anything that helps you recharge. This is different for everyone. But she encouraged us to schedule the time to make this happen.

She concluded that it is ok to ask for help and to get professional help when we need it. Overall this was a great event!

PWN was created to facilitate more interaction and networking among Sauk Valley area female professionals. The next meeting, which is open to all SVACC members, is May 17 at noon at the SVACC office (211 Locust St.) Our next event will be our summer networking event in late July. More details to come.
